# FROM THE SENIOR MINISTER

## REV INHN DICKSON

#### You asked for it: more from John Dickson on Mark 11.

I have heard through some small group leaders that a few people were disappointed last week that I didn't take the sermon right through to the end of Mark 11 and, in particular, to Jesus' promise to be able to "move mountains". Actually, I cut my thoughts about this section out of the sermon, because it was already too long. So I'm glad to pick it up off the cutting room floor.

As we saw, by cursing the fig tree and overturning the tables in the temple Jesus was offering a graphic warning—via a piece of prophetic theatre-that Jerusalem and its leadership were heading for destruction, a theme Jesus expands on in Mark 13. When this theme of judgment against Jerusalem is understood, Jesus' mention in verse 22 of "moving mountains" takes on huge significance. In reply to the disciples' astonishment at the withered fig tree (a symbol of Jerusalem's fall) he declares: <sup>22</sup> "Have faith in God. <sup>23</sup> Truly I tell you, if you say to this mountain, "Be taken up and thrown into the sea,' and if you do not doubt in your heart, but believe that what you say will come to pass, it will be done for you." As with the

cursing of the fig tree, the Old Testament background fills in the blanks here, so to speak. The prophet Zechariah not only promised the arrival of the Messiah into Jerusalem (on a colt), in chapter 14 he also predicted a future judgment upon Jerusalem and he gave advance notice of the best escape-route for the faithful: they were to go east straight over the Mount of Olives. Here's the text:

Zechariah 14. See, a day is coming for the LORD, when the plunder taken from you will be divided in your midst. 2 For I will gather all the nations against Jerusalem to battle, and the city shall be taken and the houses looted and the women raped: half the city shall go into exile, but the rest of the people shall not be cut off from the city. <sup>3</sup> Then the LORD will go forth and fight against those nations as when he fights on a day of battle. 4 On that day his feet shall stand on the Mount of Olives, which lies before Jerusalem on the east: and the Mount of Olives shall be split in two from east to west by a very wide valley; so that one half of the Mount shall withdraw northward, and the other half southward. 5 And you shall flee by the valley of the LORD's mountain.

This is obviously symbolic—strictly speaking, 'apocalyptic'—language. The prophecy assures the faithful of a speedy flight to safety right

through a 'departing' Mount of Olives. This is the idea behind Jesus' words in v.23 "...say to this mountain, 'Be taken up and thrown into the sea.' The reference to 'this mountain' makes clear he is referring not to any old mountain, or to mountains generally, but to the mountain he is actually standing on, the Mount of Olives, the same mountain Zechariah said would be removed to provide an escape for the faithful when fleeing the destruction of Jerusalem. In other words, having signified the destruction of Jerusalem in the cursing of the fig tree, Jesus now assures his followers, in highly symbolic language, that God will nonetheless provide a way of escape for them. eastward over the Mount of Olives and into the safety of the Judean hill country. The same advice appears in Mark 13:14 where Jesus says the disciples will escape the fall of Jerusalem "fleeing to the mountains" of Judea. These are the mountains just beyond the Mount of Olives. In other words, while the promise of 'moving mountains' through prayer may have a secondary application to our prayer life generally, Jesus is specifically promising apocalyptic rescue from the destruction coming upon Jerusalem (which, indeed, occurred just 40 years later).

The same topic runs through the final section in Mark 11 in the words, "Whenever you stand

praying, forgive, if you have anything against anyone; so that your Father in heaven may also forgive you your trespasses" (v.25). Some scholars think this is a random saving of Jesus that Mark attached here for no good reason. Others point out that it fits perfectly where it is, if one interprets it as a reference to the need to forgive various kinds of enemies and opponents who might turn to Christ in the final days of the fall of Jerusalem. The temptation for those forewarned by Jesus and given a pre-arranged way of escape would be to harbour bitterness and resentment toward those upon whom this judgment would come the unbelieving Jews of Jerusalem. It would have been easy to gloat over them as those who were copping what they deserved. The temptation would have been heightened by the fact that these Jerusalem officials were the ones responsible for executing Jesus. But Jesus won't have this kind of attitude. His disciples must not hold others in contempt. When former opponents of the Christians of Jerusalem end up joining the Christian movement and making their escape, long term believers must not hold their former wrong doing against them. Even if a priest of the Temple were to turn to Christ in the final days before Jerusalem fell, Christians must welcome him with open arms and a forgiving heart.
