Mark 1 – Bible Study

For the first week (THIS week), feel free to have a social get together and pray together. But if you wanted to inject some bible, here is the suggestion.

Talk together about your response to Mark 1 and James' sermon from Sunday. I've listed a summary of the 5 points. Read through them and share your reflections on why each point is important and how they impact on you.

From Mark 1 we see that Christianity is ...

1. **Biographical:** Christianity is about a person (1:1 '*about Jesus*') not a philosophy or set of principles or list of commands.
2. **Historical:** Christianity is rooted in real time and space. The word 'Gospel' (1:1 '*the good news*') means 'Newsflash!' It is public news about a public event.
3. **Jewish:** Christianity is not the opposite of Judaism it is its fulfilment. The OT promise was all about the coming Messiah (1:2 '*as it is written ...*'). His name is Jesus.
4. **Universal:** Christianity is not just for Jewish people, but the whole world, and indeed cosmos. The '*Kingdom of God*' (1:15) Jesus declared is about the restoration of all things. It is about everyone and everything. It is not merely private but public and universal.
5. **Personal:** Jesus calls US to 'follow' him (1:17). How will we respond to the King's summons?

Mark 2:1-12 – Bible Study

For Starters

- Give examples of having a real need that is not necessarily a felt/presenting need

Read Mark 2:1-12

1. As you read, what details stood out to you? Where did you feel any tension or surprise?
2. How does Jesus overturn everyone's expectations? How might each group have felt?
 - The paralysed man and his friends
 - The religious leaders
 - The watching crowd
3. How can we treat Jesus as a divine vending machine for our external problems and temporal needs?
4. Why would announcing forgiveness be interpreted as a claim to divinity? (V7)
 - Dan 9:9
 - Ps 51:4
 - Ps 103:2-3
 - Ex 34:6-7
5. Complete the logic:
 - Premise 1: *Only God can forgive sins*
 - Premise 2: *Jesus forgives sins*
 - Conclusion: *Therefore, Jesus is _____?*
6. Jesus needs to back up his claim to share God's authority. But before he proves his claim, he presents a little riddle (v9). Which is easier to say and in what sense?
 - 'Your sins are forgiven'
 - Or
 - 'Get up, take your mat and walk'

7. Why does Jesus heal the man? What does he want them/us to know? V10



The key background text for the 'Son of Man' is **Daniel 7:** ¹³ *"In my vision at night I looked, and there before me was one like a son of man, coming with the clouds of heaven. He approached the Ancient of Days and was led into his presence. ¹⁴ He was given authority, glory and sovereign power; all nations and peoples of every language worshiped him. His dominion is an everlasting dominion that will not pass away, and his kingdom is one that will never be destroyed."*

The Son of Man is a human figure who shares the very authority of God and is worshiped by all nations forever.

8. Through this episode, what does Jesus want to reveal to us
- About himself?
 - About us?
 - What category shifts might we need to make?
9. For many people 'forgiveness of sins' is far from their minds, and yet Jesus indicates it is our greatest need
- Do you believe this? Why?
 - How would you explain this to a friend who didn't share your assumptions?
10. Did you resonate with the description of faith as 'aching in Jesus' direction'? What about it appeals to you? What would it look like for you to 'ache in Jesus' direction' this week?

Pray together

Mark 4:1-30 – Bible Study

For starters

- Let's start with a riddle: "You throw away the outside and cook the inside. You eat the outside and throw away the inside." What is it?

Read Mark 4:1-9

1. What does the seed represent?
2. What is the common problem with the first three soils?
3. What does Jesus want people to do with his teaching? (Mk 4:3, 9, 23, 24, 7:14)

Read Mark 4:10-12

4. What is the purpose of Jesus speaking in parables? (Jesus quotes from Isaiah 6:8-10)
5. In what sense do the parables polarise people? What does this reveal about their heart attitude to Jesus?

Read Mark 4:13-20

6. Which soil best describes your current spiritual state? Why?
7. In what sense have any troubles, worries, wealth, or desires for other things weakened your resolve to follow the King?
8. What can we do to withstand these influences and foster a deeper walk with the Lord? What helps you fight these influences and be more like the fourth soil?

Read Mark 4:21-25

9. The means God has chosen to reveal his truth to us is through our careful listening. More light will be given to those who lean in and listen well.
 - So how is your listening going?
 - What can help God's word go deep rather than stay surface-level?

10. 'As we work on God's word, God's word works on us' Discuss.

11. Have you considered signing up to our Lent reading plan?

Read Mark 4:26-32

12. What do all these 'seed' parables teach us about what to expect as we go about sharing the message of Christ with people?

13. At the centre of the gospel message stands the ultimate seed and light, the Lord Jesus himself.

- John 12:24
- John 1:4-5
- Given this, how should we personally respond to him?

Almighty and gracious Father,
Thank you that what was once hidden you have revealed in Jesus.
Give us ears to hear.
Sow your word deep within us.
Guard us from hardness, shallowness, and distraction.
Fix our eyes on Christ — the Seed who died and rose,

Mark 7:1-30 – Bible Study

For starters

- In what ways do we (as individuals and a society) like to project ourselves as 'clean' and 'orderly'?

Read Mark 7:1-23

1. Share your initial impressions ...
2. What is the essence of the religious leader's objection (v5)?
3. What is the essence of Jesus response to them (v6-13)?
4. Have you ever gone through 'religious motions' without really engaging with God? Why do we fall into this, and what can help us to wake up?
5. How can we subtly raise our own ideas/words above God's ideas/word? Give examples ...
6. Can you name any customs/habits Christians have constructed which are not explicitly mentioned in the bible? When are these ideas problematic and when are they helpful?
7. In v14-23 Jesus' point is that performing religious regulations don't clean the heart. They are mostly external solutions to an internal spiritual problem. Our hearts.
 - Does Jesus description of the human heart make sense to you? How so?

Jesus has described the problem and what can't fix it! So, what is the solution?

Read 7:24-30

8. How would you contrast the religious leaders in 7:1-4 with this woman and her daughter?
9. What is Jesus doing in his carefully constructed response to her request (v27)?
10. How would you characterise this woman's attitude towards Jesus?
11. What about her reply do you think Jesus likes (v29)? In what sense is she a model for us?
12. Many non-Christians think that Christianity is a religion of rules to obey so that you make yourself acceptable to God. How could we get across to our friends the truth of the gospel more effectively?
13. What do you appreciate about Jesus in Mark 7? What is a key take away for you?

Pray Together

Mark 8:27-9:13 – Bible Study

For Starters

- What story about 'the good life' do you think our culture tells most loudly?

Read Mark 8:27-33

1. What is so significant about Peter's declaration in v29?
2. What does Peter get wrong and why? (v32-33)

Read Mark 8:34-38

3. Explain in your own words what Jesus means by ...
 - Denying yourself
 - Taking up your cross
 - Following him
4. In 8:35-37 Jesus frames discipleship in terms of ultimate gain and loss. Do you find His reasoning compelling? Why or why not?
 - What assumptions about life does Jesus challenge here?
 - Why can't we gain the whole world AND save our soul?
5. Where do you find it most challenging to deny yourself and carry your cross as you follow Jesus?
 - How can we recognise the goodness of this call and even find joy in it?

Read Mark 9:1-13

6. The climactic moment occurs when God the father speaks in v7-8. Why does God reaffirm Jesus' identity here (see Mk 1:11), and why is that significant after 8:27-37?

7. God instructs the disciples to ‘listen to him’ – the one at the epicentre of the Bible’s story and at the centre of the universe. What other influential voices vie for our attention and subtly disciple us?
8. How do the voices and values that shape us influence the way we hear and follow Jesus?
9. How can we grow in awareness of the influences shaping us?
10. How do our desires for comfort, success, love, security, political hope, and cultural belonging shape the way we listen to and follow a crucified Messiah?”
 - What helps us trust that Jesus’ story is better?
11. What practical step can you take this week to intentionally “listen to him” — through Scripture, prayer, obedience, or surrender in a specific area?
